June will be a key month for our team: in this month, we will respond to everyone who submitted a contribution, as well as opening registration for the conference. Important dates to keep in mind:

- 11 Jun. 2021 Notification of acceptance with reviewer comments and invitation to submit revised versions of those accepted.
- 23 Jul. 2021 Registration deadline for presenters.
- 20 Aug. 2021 Submission of revised papers for a second round of review for Data & Policy, and public registration deadline.
- 14-16 Sept. 2021 Conference.

<u>Data & Policy</u> is a peer-reviewed, open access journal dedicated to the impact of data science on policy and governance. The journal aims to promote a new theory of policy-data interactions by publishing work that considers systems of policy and data and how they relate to each other.

Data & Policy is free to read, free to contribute: any unfunded author can publish open access without paying an article processing charge, if accepted after peer review. This is thanks to support from the journal's partners (UCL, ONS and Turing Institute) and Cambridge University Press's growing Read & Publish agreements with institutions.
